Did You Know?...

New Year's Eve is one holiday celebrated in all corners of the world. Each city has unique ways of saying goodbye to the previous year and welcoming the next. San Francisco is no exception. Beginning in the 1940's until the latter part of the 20th century, San Franciscans, particularly in our Financial District, celebrated by throwing paper calendar pages out the windows of buildings in the surrounding area. Prior to the newer edifices that have since been built, older structures had windows that would open out to the streets below. San Francisco's best-known journalist Herb Caen once wrote, "On New Year's Eve, I strolled downtown Powell Street, looking at the old calendar leaves strewn about in what is said to be a custom observed nowhere else." Years later, Mr. Caen would follow up with, "The annual rain of desk calendars from offices in the financial district continues. Just the pages. Throwing the entire calendar out the window is considered bad form, and somebody could get hurt." It wasn't until the '90's that the city began to discourage the practice. The clean-up costs became just too expensive and a burden on the city's coffers. Our San Francisco Chronicle estimated that in 1978 alone, 30,000 pounds of paper were tossed out of office building windows. Though the annual practice is long gone, fond memories linger for many who witnessed this truly unique and local means of celebrating the New Year.

When in San Francisco...

Alcatraz

No prison has been made more popular in books and movies than the one on Alcatraz. This small island on the San Francisco Bay however, has a story that extends far beyond the famed penitentiary. Originally named Isla de los Alcatrazes (Isle of the Pelicans), Alcatraz Island became a part of the U.S. in 1849. During the 1850's, a fortress was built and cannons installed as, along with much of the nearby Pacific coastline, Alcatraz aided in protecting the entry into the bay, dubbed the Golden Gate. The first inclinations of what was to come appeared as the U.S. Army began holding military prisoners in the late 1850's.

Alcatraz is best known however, for the famed gangsters and notorious criminals that were sent to "The Rock" after a maximum-security federal prison was built, which began operations in 1934. No one escaped and those who managed to free themselves and dive into the chilly bay waters were never heard from again. Still, it's thought that a few may have made it across.

Now owned by the National Park Service, a limited number of tickets are sold each day. It's best plan ahead to ensure a day and time that works for you.

Coit Tower and the Filbert Steps

A wealthy eccentric and patron of San Francisco's firefighters, Lillie Hitchcock Coit left a large amount of money after her passing for the sole purpose of erecting a monument to her beloved firefighters, including those who fought the fires that engulfed much of San Francisco after the 1906 earthquake. Contrary to popular belief however, the tower was not designed to resemble the end of a fire hose. Purchase tickets for an elevator ride to the top for a spectacular 360-degree view of The City. Within its walls are murals painted by muralists who were influenced by such famed artists of the time as Diego Rivera and Raoul Dufy.

If you are keen to a workout and beautiful views of the bay, why not take the Filbert Steps beginning from the Embarcadero (waterfront) up Telegraph Hill, with Coit Tower as your reward. Or make it easier on yourself and take the steps heading down. The views will still be there.

The Presidio & Crissy Field

Once belonging to the native Ohlone people, the Presidio and the surrounding area that is now San Francisco became the northernmost outpost for the Spanish empire in western North America. After being acquired by Mexico and eventually the U.S., the United States Army established a military post on the Presidio grounds in 1847. The Presidio served as a military post through to the Vietnam War. A memorial bears the names of the 413 members of the armed forces who were lost or buried at sea in U.S. Pacific waters over World War II. Now the Presidio is a place of peace and reflection, offering hiking trails amongst the woods throughout. Many of the classic barracks have been refurbished or reimagined with restaurants or campuses such as Industrial Light and Magic.

An extension of the Presidio, it was recommended by a board of Army officers after the 1915 Panama-Pacific International Exposition that the vacant bayfront now called Crissy Field should become a site for an Air Coast Defense Station, supplementing the artillery defenses around San Francisco Bay. Named in honor of Major Dana Crissy, this airfield helped develop the air power that proved essential in winning World War II. Now a beautiful open area with reclaimed marshes, Crissy Field is ideal for a stroll, jog or a run.

UPDATE - A bold and ambitious project known as the Presidio Tunnel Tops now connects the two! Make your way from one to the other over grass and manicured greens situated atop two new tunnels, taking motorists from the Golden Gate Bridge into the city proper. Enjoy a picnic or just take in the views atop this innovative landscape.

Twin Peaks

One of San Francisco's highest points, Twin Peaks offers a spectacular vista of San Francisco and the surrounding areas. Many of our iconic landmarks can be seen from this vantage point. If you are up for a good hike, there are paths that will take you to the viewing area. The payoff will be well worth it!

Golden Gate Park

It's hard to believe that a swath of land that is longer than New York's Central Park was once nothing more than wind-swept sand dunes. Construction began in 1870 and would eventually encompass 1,017 Acres. Over the years, lakes and unique gardens were added, among them the Japanese Tea Gardens, the Botanical Gardens as well as the AIDS Memorial Grove. Enjoy a paddle boat on Stow Lake or rent a bike. You might even come across a corral of bison!

Golden Gate Bridge

Guests often think that the bridge was named after its golden appearance in the distance. Actually, the color of the bridge is International Orange. The bridge was built across an important entry into the U. S., often referred to as the golden gateway. With a span of 1.7 miles, The Golden Gate Bridge opened to the public in 1937. No one could've predicted just how iconic the structure would be to our city.

When visiting the bridge, be sure to stop by Fort Point, located underneath. During the bridge's planning stages, the thought was to demolish this Civil War era fort. After a massive outcry from residents, plans were altered for the bridge, with an updated design that would have the bridge built over the fort, thus saving this historic sight for future generations to come.

...And While in the Park

Conservatory of Flowers

Calling it a greenhouse doesn't do justice to the Conservatory of Flowers. Opened in 1879, this unique structure is the oldest wood-and-glass conservatory in North America. Take the audio-tour as you see first-hand an incredible array of unique and exotic plants from many regions.

California Academy of Sciences

Much has changed since the California Academy of Sciences opened its doors in 1853. Once drawing thousands of visitors to gawk at the taxidermied grizzly bears or the giant woolly mammoth, much of the collection was lost during the 1906 earthquake. The Academy persevered and now showcases incredible exhibits such as the Steinhart Aquarium, a cool Planetarium and a Living Roof. They've even recreated a Rain Forest! There is so much more to see, learn and enjoy.

The DeYoung Museum

A must-visit when in the park, the DeYoung Museum originated as the Fine Arts Museum with construction beginning in 1894, in time for the California Midwinter International Exposition. Named for the chair of the exposition organizing committee, Michael H. de Young, the museum has grown from an attraction originally designed to temporarily house an eclectic collection of exotic oddities to becoming the foremost museum in the western U.S. concentrating on American art, International textile arts and costumes, as well as art of the ancient Americas, Oceania and Africa.
